

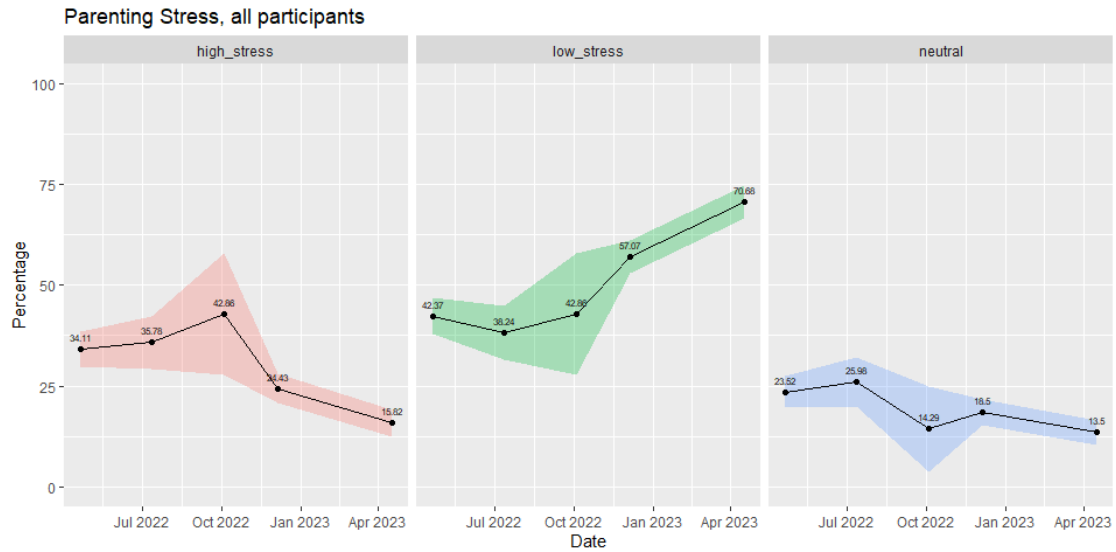

Survey questions:

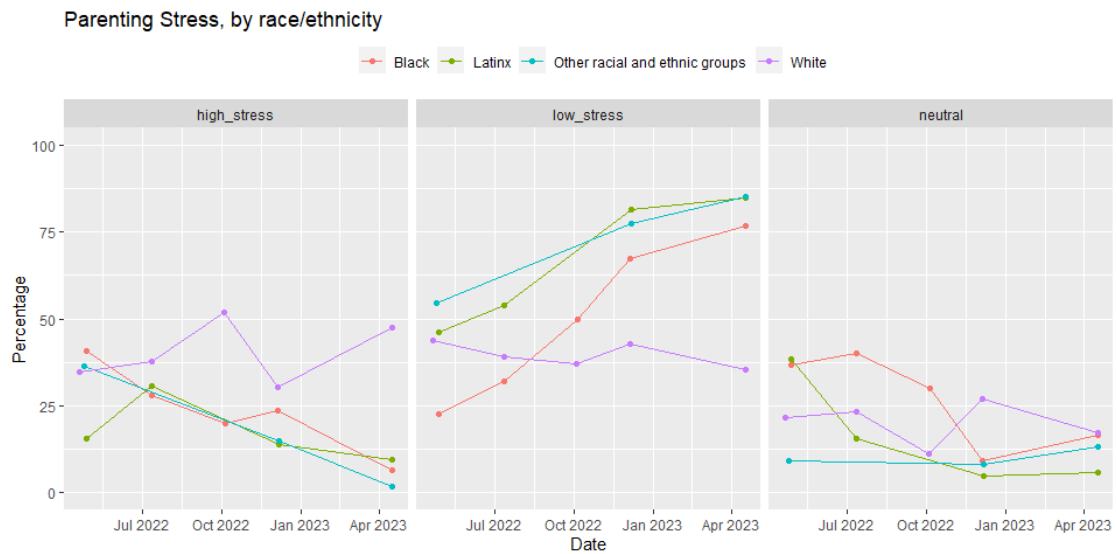
- Since the COVID-19 pandemic, I often felt like I could not handle things very well

 - Strongly agree
- Note: Responses “strongly disagree” and “somewhat disagree” were combined to indicate low stress, and “strongly agree” and “somewhat agree” were combined to indicate high stress.
- Note: Data only collected in initial recruitment surveys; Sample size too small for child disability status grouping analysis.

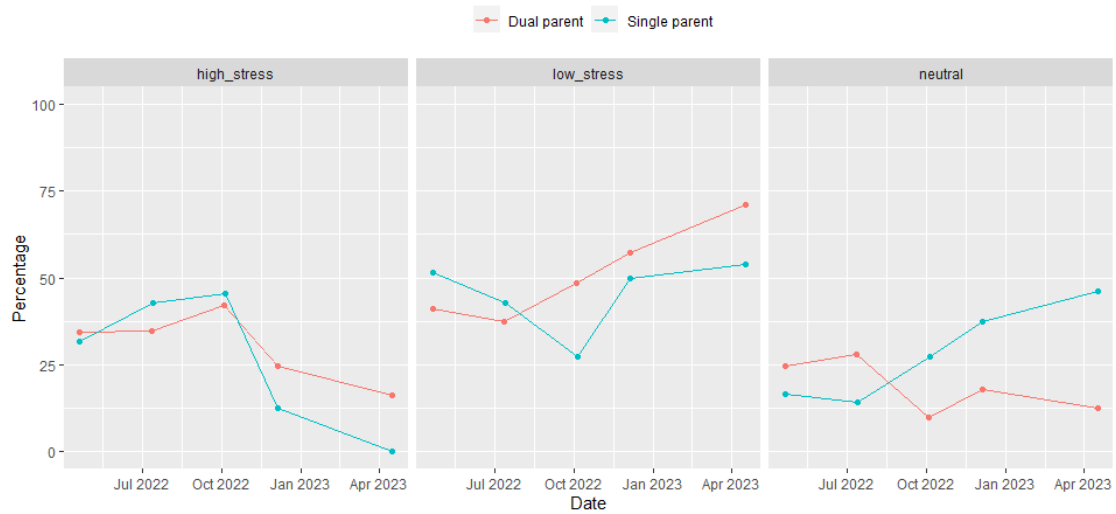

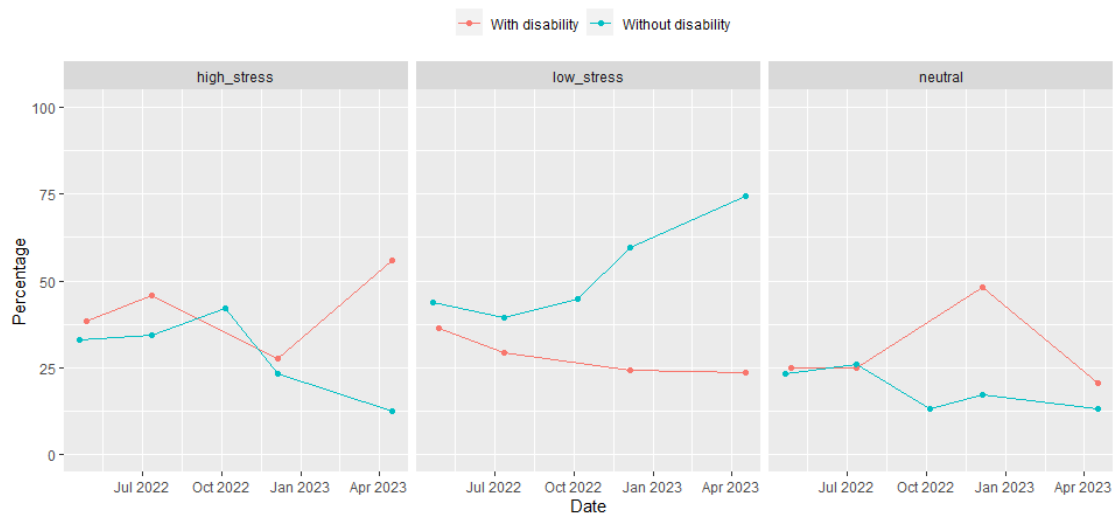
Parenting Stress, by single-parent status

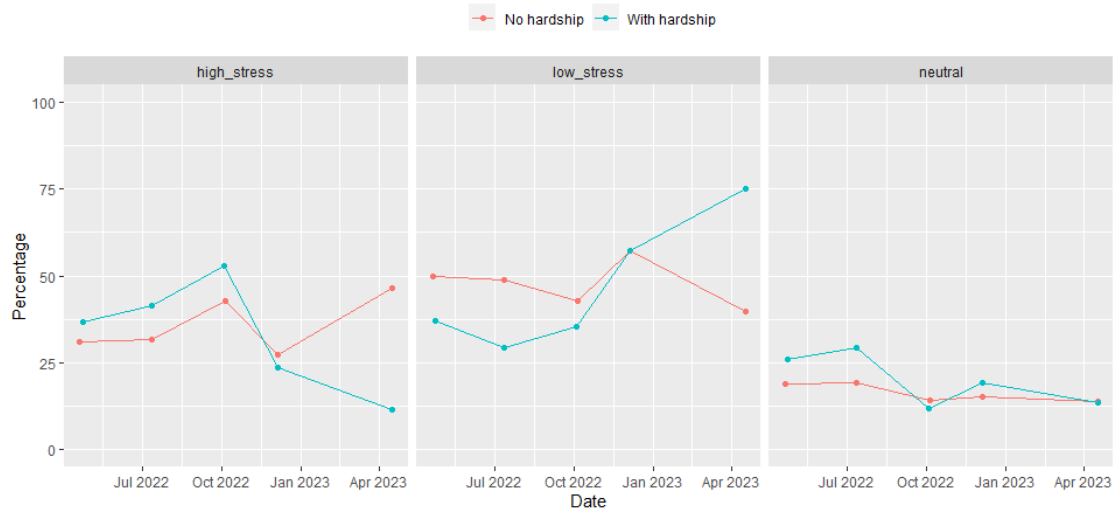

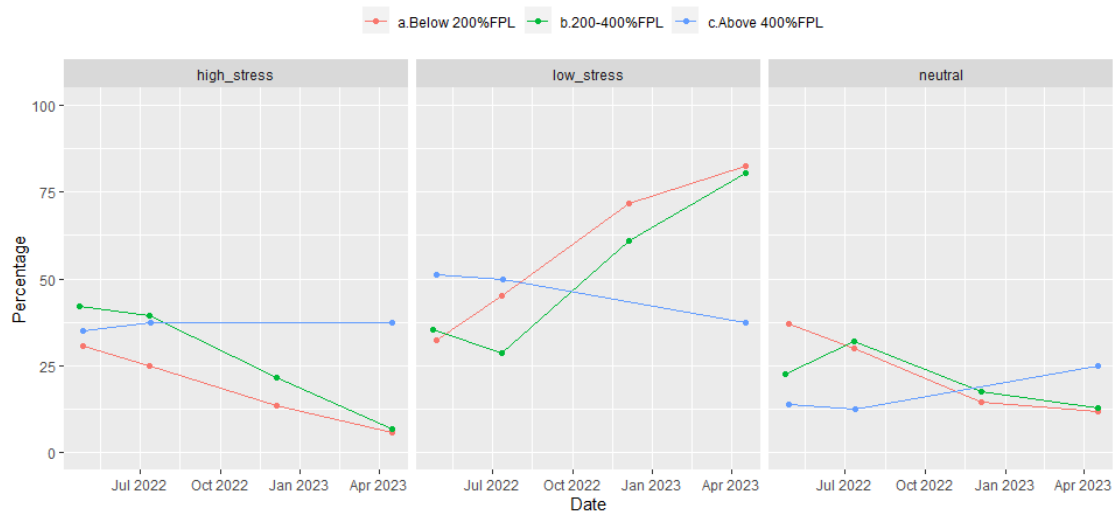
Parenting Stress, by material hardship status

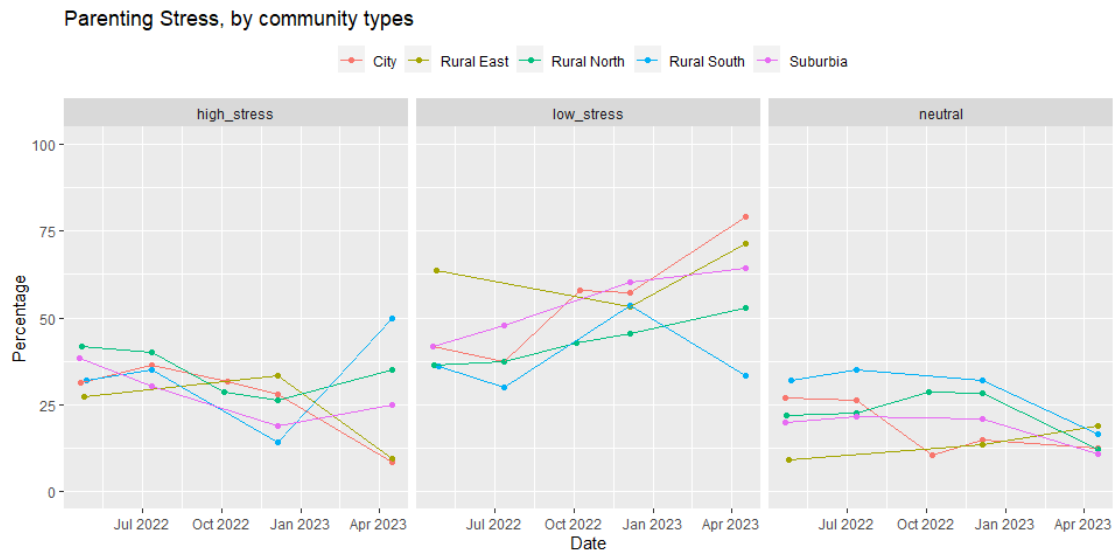

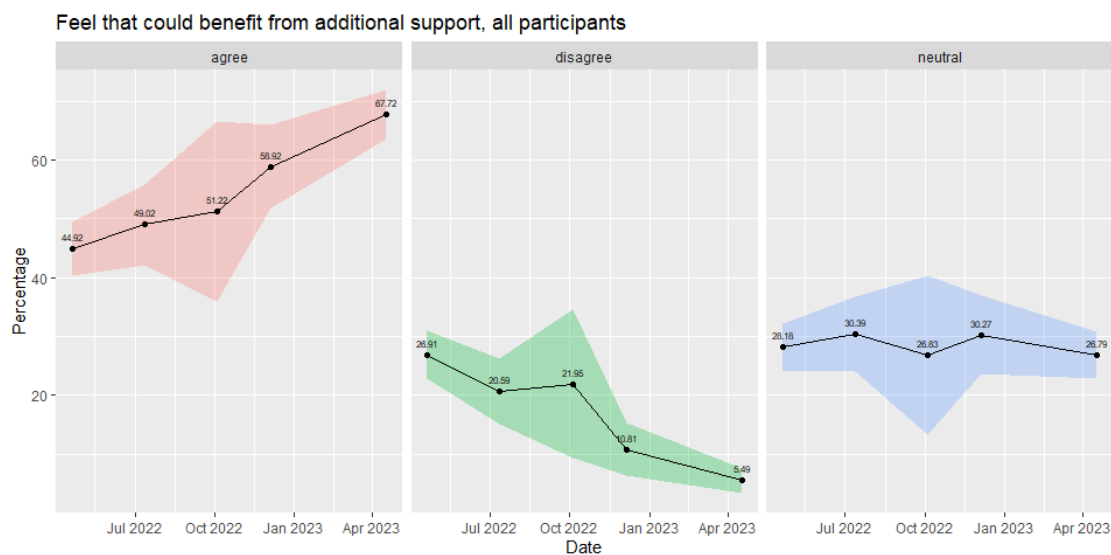


2. Benefit from additional resources/support

- Note: Sample size too small for the child disability status grouping analysis.

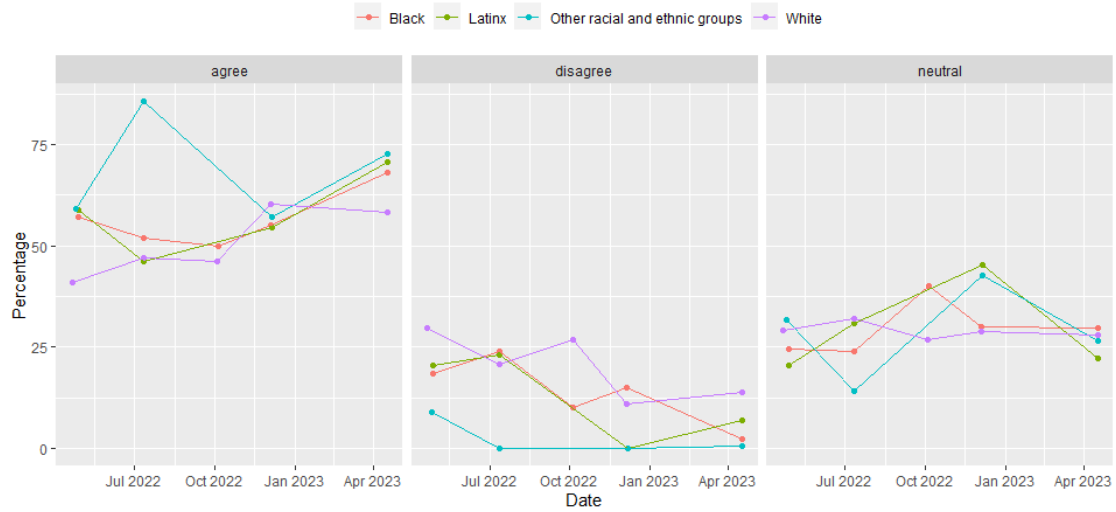

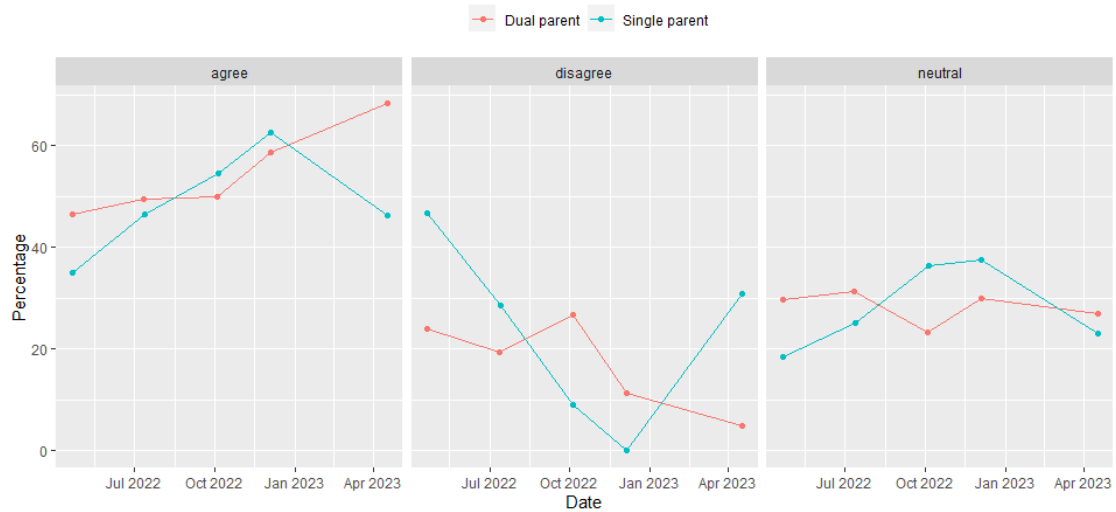

Feel that could benefit from additional support, by race/ethnicity

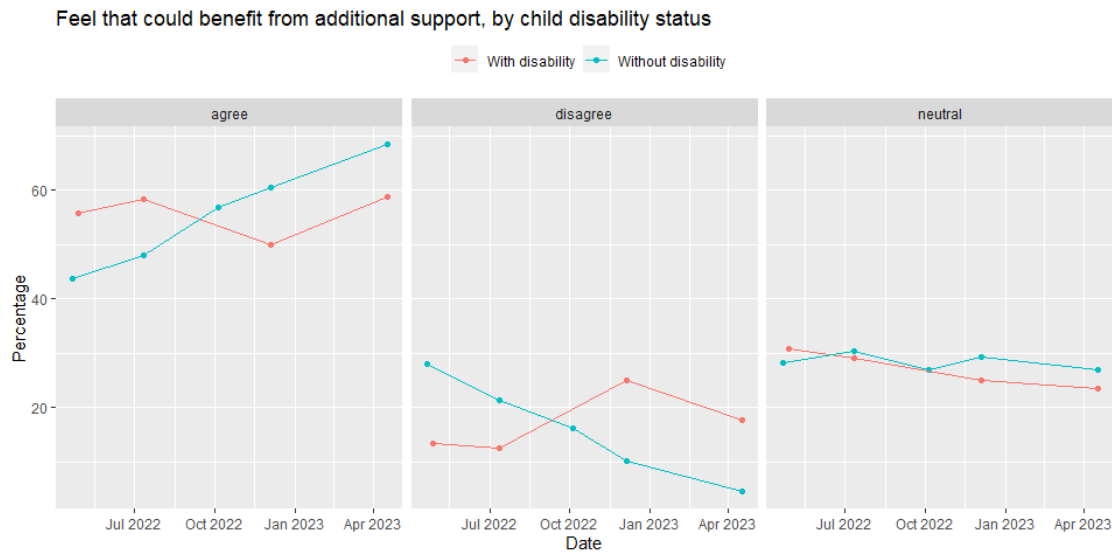

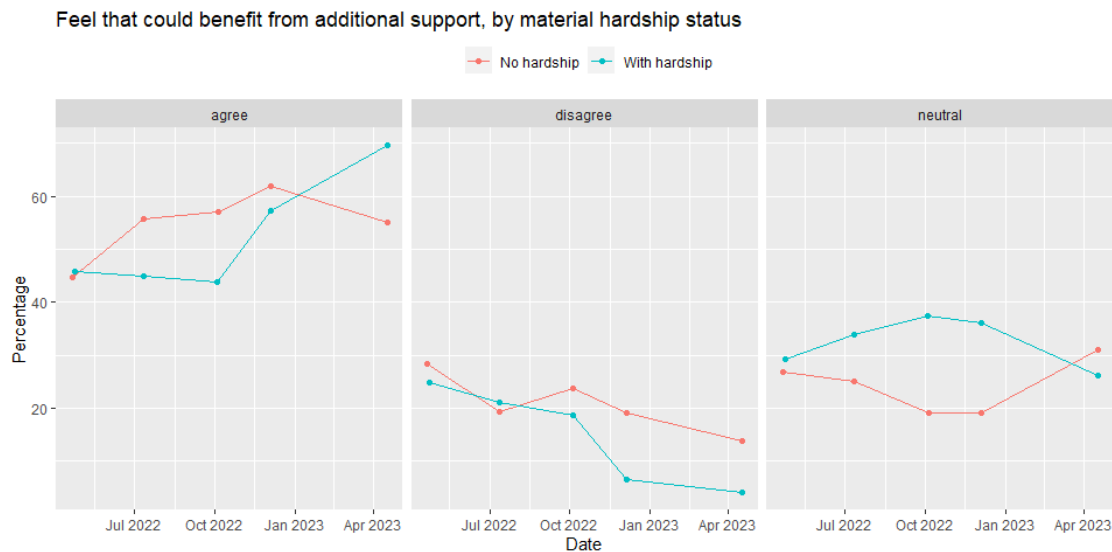
Feel that could benefit from additional support, by single-parent status

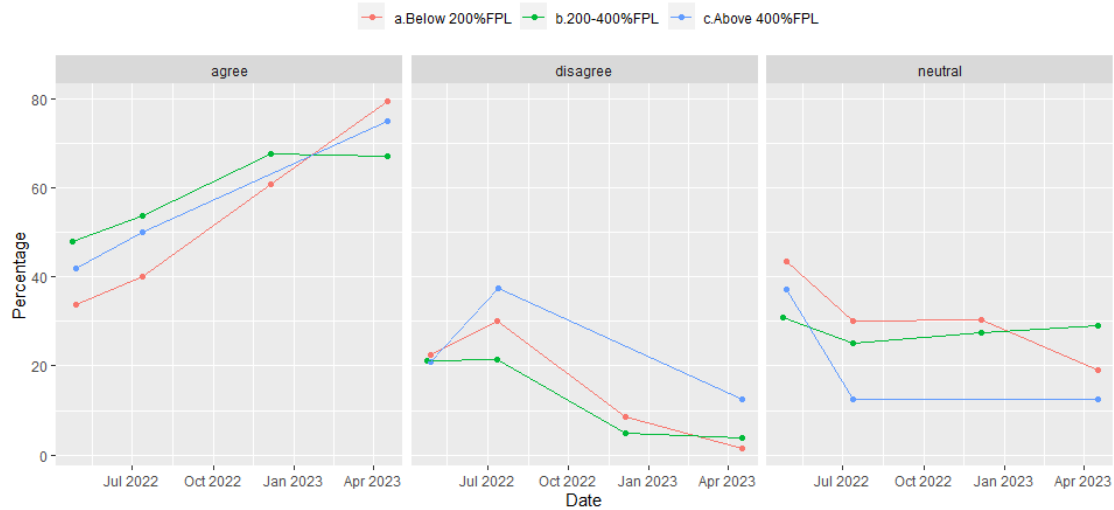

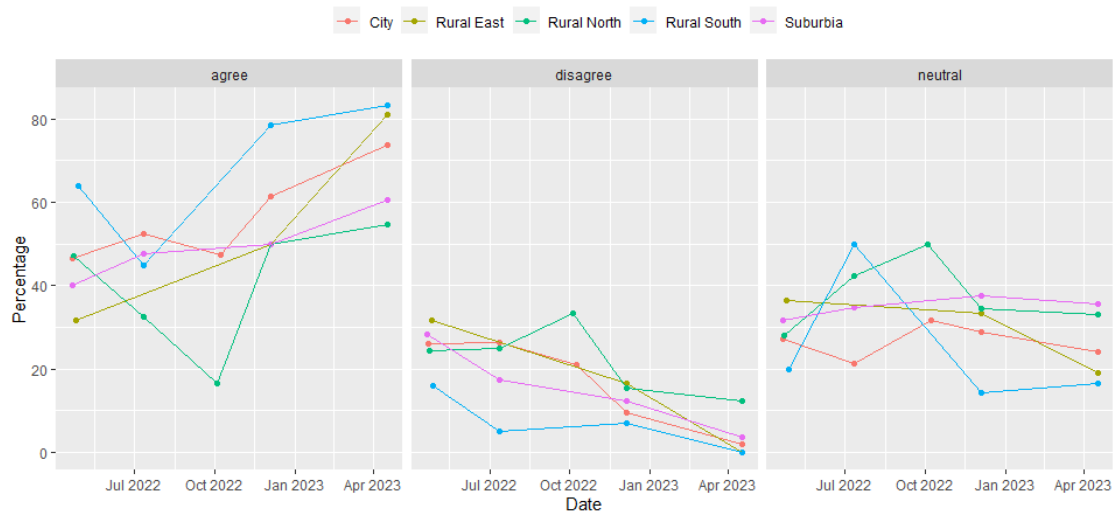
Feel that could benefit from additional support, by income levels

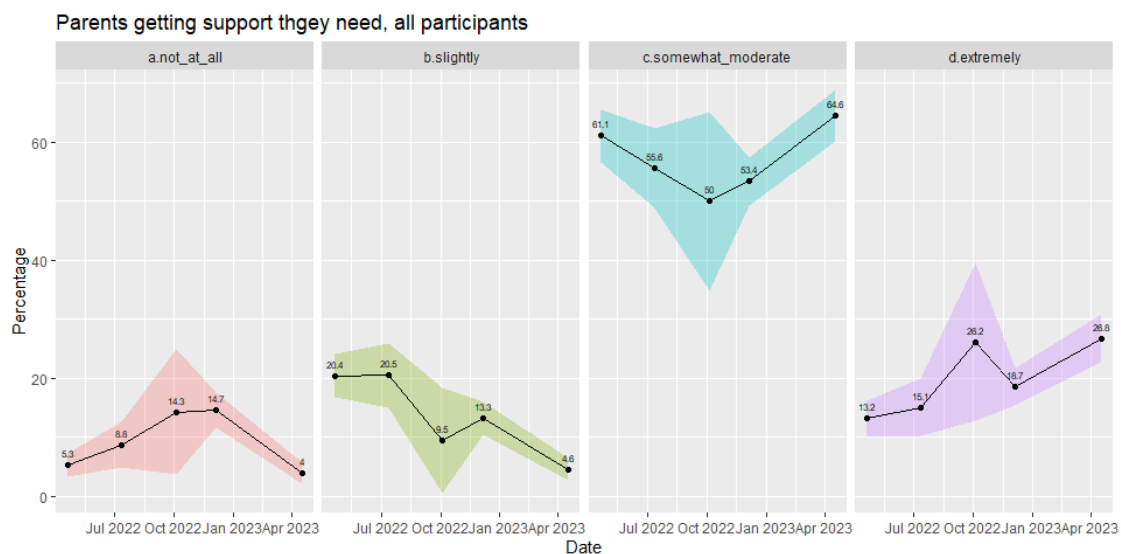


3. Get needed support

- Note: “somewhat” and “moderately” combined. Sample size too small for child disability status grouping analysis.

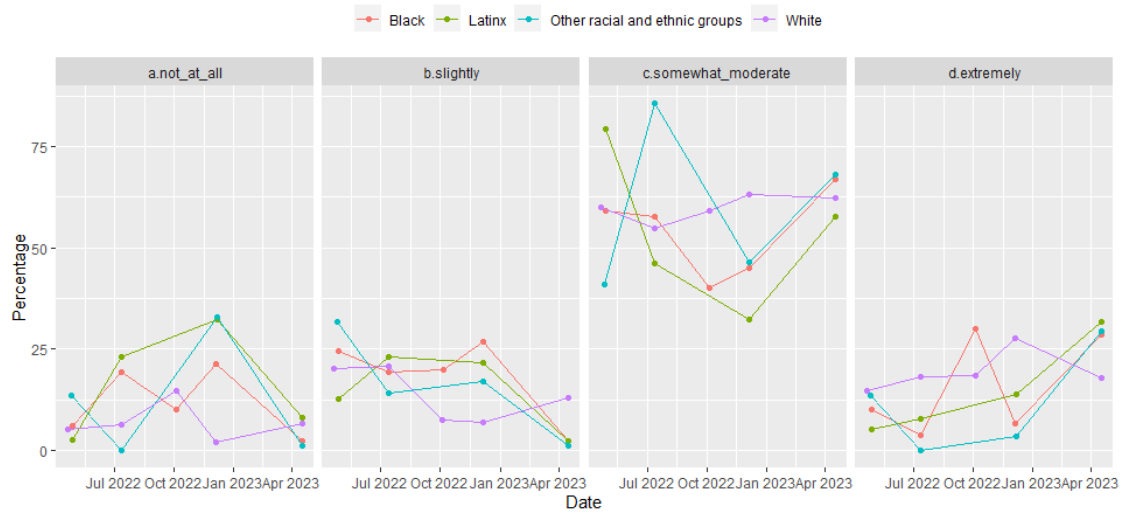

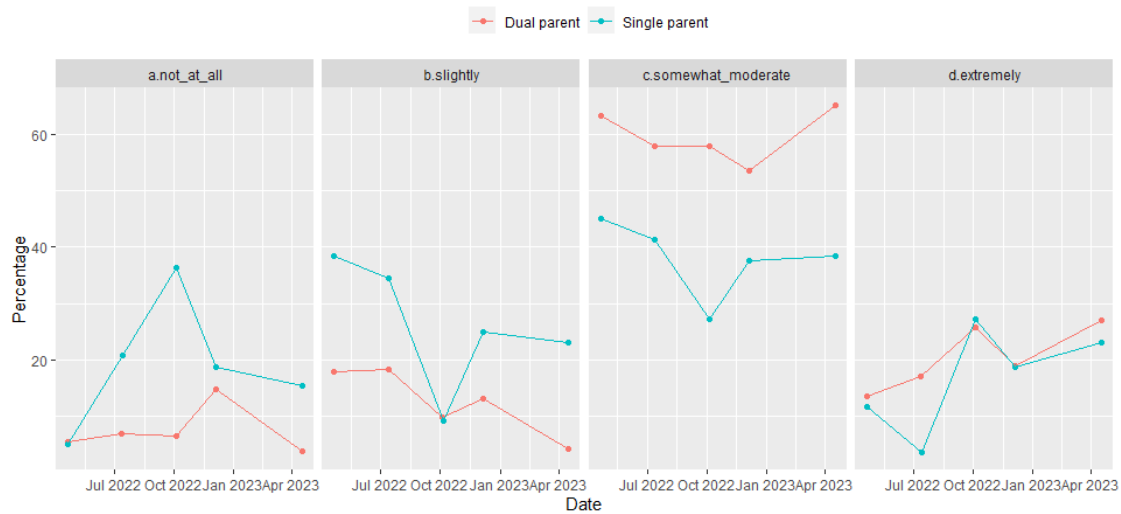

Parents getting support they need, by race/ethnicity

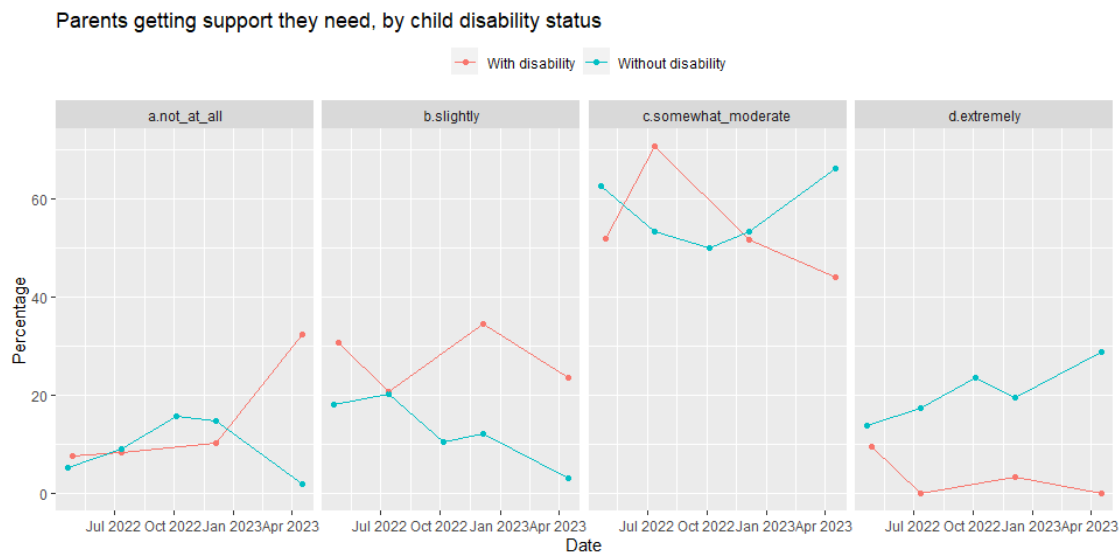

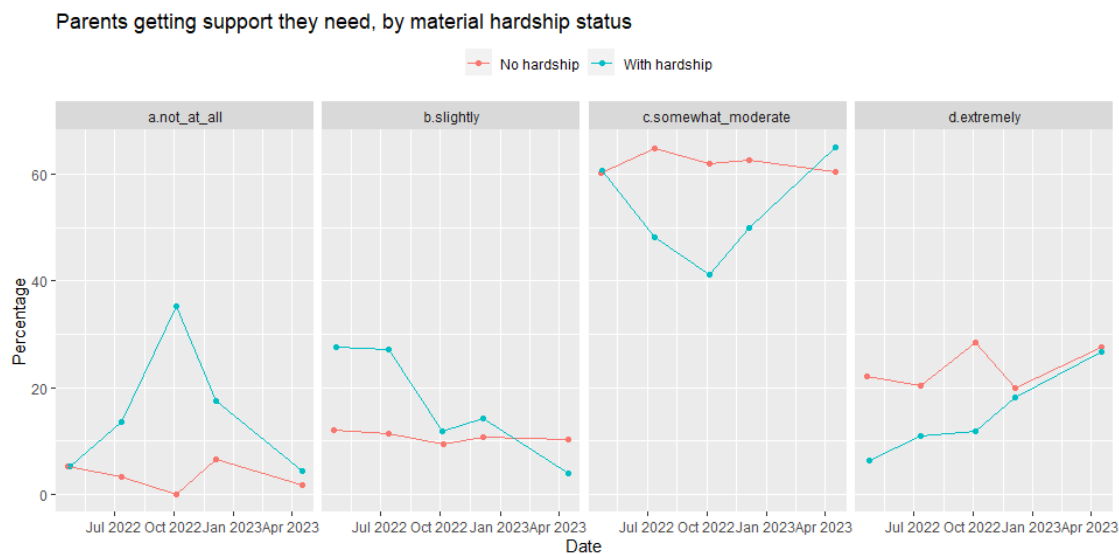
Parents getting support they need, by single-parent status

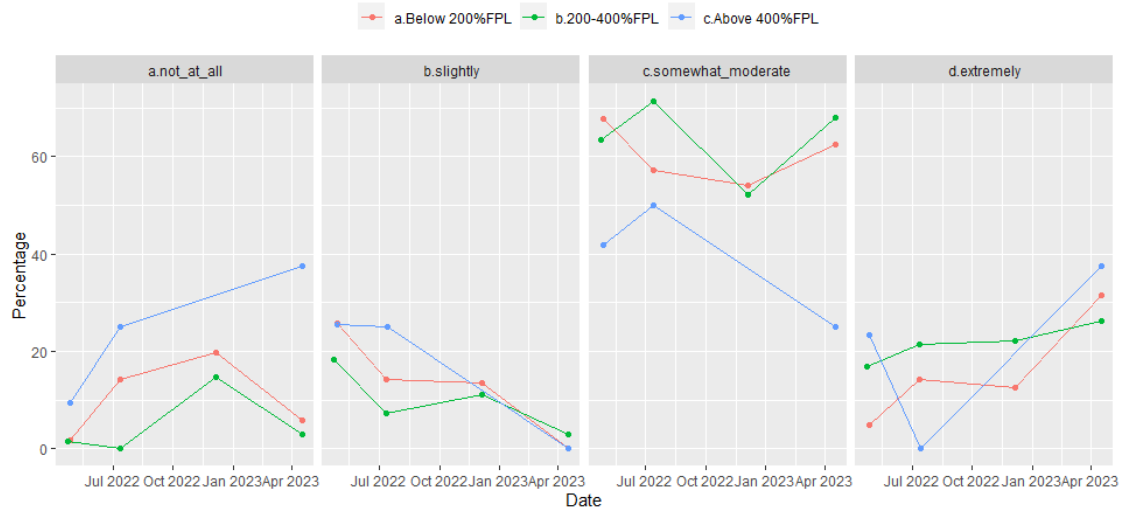
